Celebrating Three Years of Ministry At Christ UMC

• We were able to pay-off the \$234,000 mortgage on the church building as a result of a large donor gift of \$100,000, a debt reduction campaign and \$50,000 from the proceeds of the sale of the parsonage. Praise be to God!

• The church had approximately 13 classrooms in the lower level that had been empty and not in the best condition. We asked the Administrative Team for permission to seek out potential rentals for the space. We needed to quickly turn that quantity of space from liability to asset. We brought in Northstar Classical School that currently serves 48 students in grades Jr.-K to 4th grade. They intend to add a new grade annually through the culmination of 8th grade. Northstar has renovated six classrooms and updated another space which is being used for a teachers' lounge. We are currently charging them \$1,200/month for utilities since they have invested a lot of money updating their class space. It is a wonderful sound hearing little voices in the building on a weekly basis while I am upstairs in my study. Praise be to God!

• We rented another office space to Deona Bethart for her business at a cost of \$135 monthly.

• The carpet in the pastor's study as well as the outer church office was badly worn and replaced in 2019. All carpet on the first floor, including the New Life Center, was also cleaned and freshened.

• At the start of Covid-19 in 2020, we were determined to keep worship services going and took our Sunday morning services to the parking lot where members and friends could sit in their cars and listen to me preach from the back of a truck on their FM radio station as the service was live-streamed on Facebook. We had about 400 viewers from around the world including Australia and Africa. Neighbors stopped walking their dogs and sat under the tree to hear the Word of God. Praise be to God!

• A listener from Atlanta sent us a \$500 offering which we used, in part, to subscribe to the "One Call" system that allows the church to send out weekly telephone messages of hope and encouragement. The members look forward to hearing from me weekly. With a congregation where the average age is 70 and above, not many are on the internet so the "good old phone" still works.

The question that I wrestle with the most is, has God been satisfied with the services rendered over these years?

My love for music came out when I began to ponder what to write for this last newsletter article as pastor. I remembered these words from a jazz song, *"Everything must change. Nothing stays the same."* Yes, everything must change. Nothing stays the same but the promises and love of God. Even that changes as we mature in our understanding of God's unfailing love. As a result, we become more loving, trusting and begin to live with more power.

Our growth in the understanding of God's love and power is what will remain the constant. Wynlita and I will cherish the memories of Christ UMC and the friends and family we have come to love and serve. You have been a great part of our lives; accepting and supporting us in our work, leisure and spiritual life. Time and space will never break the bond we have developed, and change will continue as we seek a new relationship from the parsonage family, to just friends and family.

Change is a part of life. Christ UMC will change as time has changed, from a small community of loving persons in a small frame church into a larger loving community in a large brick church. We can stand up and prophesy our future with words of faith and victory, or we can simply prepare for death by continuing to speak nothing but words of failure and defeat. I challenge you to change your world by changing your word. When we join forces with each other and the power of the Holy Spirit, nothing or no one is going to stop us from being successful at our mission to win souls for our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

The late John Lewis said it best, **"We may not have** chosen the time, but the time has chosen us." I close with these words from Dr. Charles Stanley, *"Always obey God and leave the consequences to Him."*

• Financially, we have been able to pay all of our bills yearly. However, Conference apportionments have not been paid in the last five years. We were blessed to receive \$30,000 from the PPP government grant program which allowed us to break even at the end of 2020.

- A new Apple computer was donated by a family in the church to improve of our worship experience.
- The church parking lot was resurfaced and restriped.
- All light bulbs in the sanctuary were replaced with LED light bulbs as a result of a \$500 private donation.
- A new Apple iPad was purchased for live streaming our worship services.

Having mentioned all of this, the greatest joy of my ministry at Christ Church has been the response of the congregation to the preached Word of God. Six months after I was appointed here, one of my parishioners said this to me: "Pastor, I have nothing against intellectual sermons, but your sermons are more spirit filled and it feeds my soul." Hallelujah! God has used me to teach His word and bless His people.

In 2019, we were introduced to J. Anthony Mosley, M.A., LPCC, NCC, DAPA, CRS, Licensed Professional Clinical Counselor and Parish Consultant, and it was recommended that we hire him to work with us. We paid \$5,000 for his services. It is my prayer that the church will revisit his report and do a self-examination of its ministry and purpose. I have lifted from his report two sections that relate to what has transpired at Christ UMC in the last six months.

THOSE INTERVIEWED

Over a period of three and a half days, I conducted 61 interviews that included individuals and couples. I also had conversations with three clergy and District Superintendent Dr. Todd Anderson. Over 90% of the interviewees were over the age of 60. About half of those I interviewed have been members for over twenty years. Nine individuals identified themselves as non-members. Many of those I spoke to reported having family members who attend or have attended in the past.

HISTORY OF CONFLICT

A number of past and recent controversies have had a significant impact on relationships at Christ United Methodist Church. Although a number of people referenced more recent events, I heard a number of comments that mentioned concerns going back over twenty-five years. The topics I heard about repeatedly were a previous pastor's infidelity, a previous youth leader leaving and starting a new church, the leasing of solar panels, the combining of two worship services, the renting of the church to Northstar School, and most recently conflict surrounding pastoral and lay leadership. The following comments are what I heard repeatedly from individuals in one form or another.

"There has been a divide for a long time." "We've been through conflicts before." "We didn't heal from the pastor's affair in the past." "There is a correlated decline each time a pastor leaves." "Going to one service was a mistake." "We're hard on pastors." "There is a refusal to mediate issues and seek resolution." "Recent conflicts started when changes were being made." "There was a lot of controversy over Northstar School." "There were a lot of issues going on before Pastor Dixon came." "We never rebounded from controversy over a youth leader leaving." "People are butting heads over the solar panels." "It was a big mistake the conference didn't step in a long time ago." "There is a lot of ego centered attitudes." "Recent conflicts have become more and more hurtful." "When a popular pastor left it went downhill from there."

PASTORAL AND LAY LEADERSHIP

As I listened to people speak about the ministry of Pastor Wynston, there were varying opinions about how they viewed his work at Christ UMC. By far, most people were very complimentary about his preaching, the handling of conflict and stated numerous times really liking him. On the other end of the spectrum some mentioned concerns about his responses to conflict. Following are a number of comments I heard, many of them repeatedly.

"I respect him highly, he is a wonderful man of God." "The way he addresses concerns with the board is a concern." "I've seen him in so many situations and never heard a negative thing." "He is a great preacher." (most stated positive) "He could have handled things better." (most stated negative) "He wants to be in charge of little things." "His passion for God is wonderful." "He could say things more tactfully." "His messages have stirred people." "He is making things happen." "He didn't ask enough questions about our current structure." "He has brought transparency in his leadership." "We really like him." "I've seen people change since he's been here." "I am growing under his leadership." "He questions things; it's healthy." "He is definitely a change in leadership style."

Finally, my beloved, the solar panels have become the elephant in the room for this church. From all of the reports that I have received from the Leadership Team's investigation of the panels, it is a fact that we have 2 contracts on these panels. One for \$650,000 and another for \$1.2 million. The current balance on this \$1.2 million contract is about \$850,000. This is the balance on the signed contract. I don't understand why the District allowed a church this size to go into such a large debt, but my advice to you is to ask your Leadership Team never to put the church in such large debt without the approval of 90% of the congregation. The Leadership Team has brought in professionals in the last six months. They have documented that the cost for these panels in 2010 with installation should have been about the \$650,000 figure. In all actuality, with this figure the church should only have a balance of \$450,000 and not \$850,000. If this matter is not handled properly and resolved, it will have a great impact on the future of the church. I wish the Leadership Team the best as they pursue this matter.

God has a future for you if the church will submit to the Holy Spirit's direction and not our own.

Proposals Approved at Charge Conference

For the past several months, the CUMC Administrative Board, Finance Committee and Financial Task Force have met to study the church's finances. We have looked at all expenditures and all projected income over recent years as well as 2021 and into the future. Dee Sellers, Chairperson of Finance, and Dave Sauter, Interim Treasurer, have worked with the groups to identify areas where we could make cuts to impact the budget.

The Administrative Board has approved reductions in spending, salary cuts, and service contracts that have lead to a savings of \$19,617 over the 2021 budget year. However, these cuts will not bring our spending in line with our income, and we will still have a projected deficit of \$18,000 plus unpaid apportionments of \$28,000 for a total deficit of \$46,000 for the year 2021.

At the same time, the Administrative Board decided that the church must have a plan for expanding ministries as the pandemic becomes more manageable. To that end the Board voted to set aside the money received from the sale of the van (\$17,500) to be used to expand family and children's ministries. All of this information has been sent previously either via email or USPS mail to members of the congregation.

After careful review, the Administrative Board voted to call for a Charge Conference to present the following two proposals to the members:

PROPOSAL 1: To decrease the pastoral position package by \$46,481, from \$106,481 to \$60,000, effective July 1, 2021 which will likely result in a less than full-time pastor. Obviously this will be a huge step in balancing our budget.

PROPOSAL 2: Christ United Methodist Church will employ at an hourly rate a Family and Children's Services leader to develop and implement programming for family and children's ministries.

The Charge Conference met on March 25, 2021 with the Rev. Dr. Todd Anderson presiding. After presentations by members of the Administrative Board and a question and answer period, Charge Conference members voted to accept the two proposals from the Administrative Board. The Administrative Board will be reacting to these proposals with planning our next steps forward.

We are excited about the work of the Focus Group for Family and Children's Ministry, and believe our plan to move forward is a good one.

In addition, the focus group is hoping to include Northstar School in some programs beginning next Fall. Each of these options are still in the planning stages, and we will need the help and support of each of you for this ministry to succeed. Please be in prayer for both a leader and this new program ministry. Thank you.



As part of Christ Church's family and children's ministry initiative, Gail Rose has agreed to help connect us to Northstar. While NORTHSTAR conversations begin to identify the details, Northstar continues to expand by adding a fifth grade

class beginning Fall 2021 as well as steadily increasing enrollment and co-curricular offerings. Dave Sauter will continue in his role assisting as liaison for issues such as building needs and contracts. We are indeed blessed by the sounds of young Christian voices!

Finance Update

At the end of the first quarter, we have received \$77,567 in income which includes all Sunday giving (envelope, loose change, etc.), rents, Ameriprise dividends, PPP grant monies (\$10,000) and Atrium grant monies (\$8,250). Expenses for the first quarter totaled \$67,504. We have received 25% of our projected budgeted income and have spent 30% of our projected budgeted expenses. While we are making progress toward a balanced budget, we are still not there. The janitorial, insurance and staff reductions went into effect in March 2021. However, the pastoral reduction will not go into effect until July 1, 2021.

The Administrative Team would like to thank you for your prayers, services and stewardship, and will continue to look for ways to increase our income and lower our expenses. May God continue to bless you and our church family.

Volunteers Utilized for Building Maintenance

There are many repair items that appear frequently at Christ Church that are handled by volunteers rather than by an outside repair service. Following is a partial list of repairs completed during the last few months by our dedicated and skilled volunteers.

- Remove and replace outside faucet on Holly Street side, re-grout and mortar in.
- Install a water line including shut off and drain valves to the outside faucet near the south west corner of the NLC.
- Run an outside line with a hose faucet to outside of solar panel fence.
- Replace broken ceiling tiles.
- Install new light fixtures in restrooms near elevator in lower level.
- · Install sink in lower kitchen including necessary plumbing.
- Repair clogged condensation lines on two air handlers in NLC.
- Repair leak from condensation line in NW end of NLC.
- Installed two new fill valves in women's restroom on west end of NLC.
- Installed new toilet in men's restroom on west end of NLC.
- · Repaired two leaking faucets in ladies restroom in Narthex area.
- Install new lights for stained glass picture of Jesus in Narthex.
- · Replace ceiling tiles in Pastor's office and ladies restroom in NLC.
- Clean pilot lights on stove in kitchen.
- Repair damaged podium in Narthex.
- · Scrape, seal, patch and paint numerous areas on the block walls downstairs from water damage.
- · Repair cracks in block wall in Narthex and front entrance fover then paint them.
- · Repair soffit on south side of building and grease conduit to keep critters out.
- Install two new fill valves in girl's restroom near choir room. Adjust flow in urinals at west end of NLC.
- Mulch and weed prayer garden.
- Patch pothole in lot entrance off Holly Street.
- All mowing of CUMC grounds.
- All outside landscaping.

THE STORY BEHIND LOVE PACKAGES...

Stephen J. Schmidt and his wife started *Love Packages* in the summer of 1975 in their basement in Butler, Illinois. "God spoke to me as clearly as could be." That summer, God showed him the abundance of Christian literature that he had at his disposal and the tremendous lack of literature in third world nations. Not realizing that everyone was as wasteful as he was, Schmidt began to send excess literature overseas. In the first year, they shipped 60 boxes of literature to missionaries in 4 countries. Soon the word spread, and friends began bringing their excess literature to them as well for shipment overseas. And then they began receiving literature by mail from all over the United States. In their second year (1976) they shipped 3.5 tons.

Statistics indicate that every piece of literature will be read by an average of 20 people. Each container has at least 1 million pieces so each shipment of literature has the potential to reach 20 million people every time *Love Packages* sends a container. *Love Packages* sends 20-foot ocean-going containers to port cities around the world. These locations act as distribution points and have the capability to distribute these materials to thousands of churches overseas.

Love Packages is a non-profit organization and has facilities in Butler, Illinois and Decatur, Alabama. The sorting and packing is all done by volunteers at both locations. *Love Packages* depends upon private donations to cover shipping costs.

Christ Church has been actively involved in *Love Packages* since 2014. From 2014 until the end of 2020, Christ Church has collected 1,279.2 pounds of materials. We collect religious material, new and used, and it is picked up by *Love Packages* volunteers from New Freedom Church in Lebanon, Ohio.

Please leave your materials for *Love Packages* in the marked "Love Packages" container (on the floor near the bookcases) in the library. There is no monetary involvement for Christ Church for this mission of spreading God's word throughout the world.

Matthew 25 Ministries is an international relief ministry based in Cincinnati. Its mission is to fulfill Matthew 25:34-40 by providing food to the hungry, clean water to the thirsty, clothing to the naked, affordable shelter to the homeless, medical care to the ill and humanitarian supplies to those in need.

Christ Church collects empty plastic pill bottles (over-the counter included) for Matthew 25. Any color of plastic bottles is accepted. Matthew 25 Ministries recycles the bottles to provide financial support for their work.

Since 2012 Christ Church has collected a total of **16,834** pill bottles for Matthew 25 with **3,639** of these pill bottles collected in the year 2020. We are awaiting a pick-up of 600 pill bottles collected so far in 2021. Volunteers from New Freedom Church in Lebanon, Ohio pick up our pill bottles and deliver them to Matthew 25 in Cincinnati.

In 2020 Matthew 25 shipped more than 930 truckloads of aid - the most they have ever shipped in a single year; helped over 23 million people - the most they ever helped in a single year.

Matthew 25 distributed more than 18.5 million pounds of desperately-needed supplies, including over 6 million pounds of COVID-19 relief supplies.

We can continue to help Matthew 25 with our collection of empty pill bottles (no glass, please.)
