Letter from the Pastor



Greetings, Beloved!

WHO RUNS THE CHURCH?

Breathe deeply and ask God to reveal the answer.

I recall being a seminary student among many pastors. I was somewhat daunted by their collective experiences in parish ministry. One pastor stated certain activity "would not be allowed in *my* church." I cringed. The seminary professor softly asked, "*Whose* church, George?" There was an emphasis placed on the word *whose*. I have witnessed laity leadership pronounce to pastors, "*We* run *our* church." Lord, have mercy. The Bible is the only authoritative source revealing the inception and functionality of the Christian church.

¹⁸ And I tell you, you are Peter,^[d] and on this rock^[e] I will build **my** church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. (Matthew 16:18)

¹⁸ **He is the head** of the body, **the church**; he is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead, so that he might come to have first place in every-thing. (Colossians 1:18)

²² And he has put all things under his feet and has made him **the head over all things for the church**, ²³ which is **his body**, the fullness of him who fills all in all. (Ephesians 1:22)

According to scripture, Jesus built The Church and is the head of His Church. And the Church said, "Amen." Physical bodies can function without many interior and exterior parts, but not a head.

Friends, Jesus is the figurative head of the body of people referred to as The Church. The Holy Spirit in each follower of Jesus Christ runs the church. What does that look like? When the body functions properly with Jesus as the head, it is evident by Jesus being first in the body's prayer life (private and corporately), thoughts, behaviors, decisions, and the agenda of ordained clergy and servant leadership. The Jesus in every believer is revealed by acts of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. (Ephesians 5:22-23). If these attributes of Jesus Christ are not prominent in a church body, then Christ is not the head of the gathering of people who profess to be the church of Jesus Christ.

As we journey through the Lenten season, let us be prayerful and mindful of the One who loves us, saved us, and gives us yet another chance to love more fully. Let us allow Him to run His church through us.

Lucas was appointed as a new church start pastor to Faith Community UMC in West Chester, and from there launched Water's Edge UMC in Mason, Ohio in 2013. *"I am humbled by the trust Bishop Palmer has in me to lead the churches and pastors of the Ohio River Valley, and I will be honored to sit at the cabinet table," said Rev. Lucas.*

OPPORTUNITIES THROUGH UMCOR TO RESPOND TO WAR IN UKRAINE and TORNADO IN IOWA

The Rev. John Calhoun, a former United Methodist missionary to Ukraine, provides the following information on how to best support the United Methodist response in Ukraine.

"Our hearts are heavy with grief over the invasion and bombardment of Ukraine by Russian forces. The suffering has already been great, and it appears that many dark days and nights lie ahead . . . Today, in the midst of war, United Methodists continue to serve others. As many thousands across Ukraine are fleeing their homes in search of safe sanctuary, UMC congregations in western Ukraine are opening their hearts and doors, providing food, shelter, and other forms of emergency care to family in need."

LVE PACKAGES

Christ Church started collecting Christian materials for **Love Packages** in 2014. Through early March 2022, Christ Church has collected 1,494.11 pounds of Christian materials. This is an average of approximately 186 pounds per year.

A recent testimony from Zimbabwe: "Love Packages distributors normally give out books to a hospital in Zimbabwe, but due to Covid were not allowed into the hospital and gave a box of Love Packages books to the lady in charge of the hospital. In that box was a book entitled 'Wilmington's Guide to the Bible.' One patient, who was a pastor being treated for high blood pressure, picked that book. This pastor had been praying for five years for books to train some men for the ministry. The answer to his 5-year prayer was the 'Wilmington's Guide to the Bible' in the Love Packages box. This book contains all the teachings from Genesis to Revelation, and the pastor's vision was to empower school students in the Word of God. Now his vision has come to pass."

Both adult and children's Christian materials can be left in the container on the floor in the library underneath the mail slots.



Christ Church started collecting pill bottles for Matthew 25 Ministries in 2012 and through early March of this year, has collected a total of 22,261 pill bottles. This is a average of approximately 2,782 pill bottle per year.

Our pill bottle collection is recycled for cash to support Matthew 25 program ministries. More than 99% of cash and in-kind donations go toward their programs to feed the hungry, provide clean water to the thirsty, provide clothing to the naked, provide affordable shelter to the homeless, provide medical care to the ill, and provide humanitarian supplies to those in need. At present, Matthew 25 is responding to the humanitarian needs of the people of Ukraine.

You can continue to leave your empty pill bottles in the container in the library located on the top of the file cabinet. We accept both prescription pill bottles and over-the-counter pill bottles. (*We cannot accept any glass bottles, however.*)


